

2025 Indianapolis PIT Count

On **January 22, 2025**, the Indianapolis community conducted the federally mandated Point-in-Time (PIT) Count. The PIT Count is an annual, single-night census of residents who are experiencing the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) definition of homelessness.

PIT Counts from communities across the nation are included in the Annual Homeless Assessment Report, which informs federal policy on housing and homelessness. Locally, the PIT Count is used to inform community decision making and advocacy efforts.
